On reading the September Newsletter, I thought I should share some memories

Years ago, Graham Tindale (N.S.W.) E58, visited Canada and discovered a large fleet of Es. Fibreglass hulls were making an appearance.

On the day he visited their race, there was a film of ice on the water, so the fibreglass boats were sent around the course to break the ice and save damage to the ply boats.

As entertainment at a Club meeting, a film was shown of racing Es in England. The location looked like an enormous brick pit holding a lot of water. Obviously they had wind problems. If unable to make their way out of a hopeless position, they were entitled to drop their anchors to stop their boats. Imagine our amazement at what sailors would do to have a sail!!!

On one occasion, I think, to celebrate Jack Holt's birthday, we (N.S.W.) arranged through Qantas to bring him out to Sydney. We arranged for every Holt designed dinghy to attend at Clontarf on the Harbour. I recall 60 Enterprises regularly sailed from Clontarf at the time. All sorts of designs turned out for the event on an almost perfect day – not a breath of wind – ALL DAY!!

There is an opinion that when designing the E, the designer wondered what to call it. He doodled away and experienced a bright thought! Perhaps we could run a competition to see how many members know of it, or can work it out.

VALE MARGARET EMILY SUTHERLAND 8th. October 1920 – 19th. November, 2004

It is with great sadness that we hear of the passing of Margaret. She and Maurice will be remembered by the older members for their friendship and for all the work they did for the Association over many years.

They brought the E to Qld. in 1966 and under their nurturing the class grew amazingly from their E 101 *Skipjack* to having 70 Es on the Queensland Register by 197, with another 7 under construction. A fleet of between 16 and 18 sailed regularly at Humpybong each Sunday with an ever-increasing number of boats in Toowoomba, sailing on Cooby Dam, and others at Cleveland, Lake Cootharaba and Brisbane Sailing Clubs.

Maurice and Margaret **WERE** the E's. We had such great help from them both. They were always there early (as we all were to be later) to help newcomers and take prospective sailors for a sail. Before setting out for the afternoon's race we would all sit around together chatting and having lunch. They were hard to beat in those days – Maurice wasn't called 'the old fox' for nothing. We can still see them now, sitting close together on the gunwale, keeping that boat just so flat even without the benefit of trapeze – much envied and admired by those with light and *novice* crews who *were* on trapeze.

They organized, not just State and National Titles, but picnic days to encourage the non-racing members to be part of our group. We had b-b-cues – who can forget Margaret's Pavlovas!!! We went to the Frostbite Regatta hosted by the Warwick Sailing Club each year and all camped together on Leslie Dam with a huge bonfire enjoyed at night – much needed – Warwick on the June weekend!!!!! Can remember one morning having to walk through ice around the edge of the dam before the race. We can only ever remember Maurice and Margaret capsizing *once* (it just wasn't their thing) and that was at the Frostbite on a particularly windy day – something we're sure Margaret would never have forgotten – she had to be 'towed' into shore through that freezing water!!!!

The Boat Show was another 'must' for them and we were all co-opted. Maurice supported the development of the first 'glass' E by the National body and bought the prototype *Evolution* and brought it to Queensland. It, of course, took pride of place on our stand at the Boat Show that year. Sailing over from Humpybong to Sandgate to be part of the atmosphere at the start of the Brisbane to Gladstone Yacht Race each year was another must and Maurice and Margaret were never happier than when the non-sailing members of the families could be persuaded to come with us on these days.

These are just some of the things Maurice and Margaret did to make "Sailing an E" one of life's remembered joys.

They were such good fun too. Shall we ever forget when they had a camper on top of their car - Maurice and Margaret were not young and not what you would call 'light-weights' either – the year we camped at Fort Glanville, S.A. we think. Well *everyone* was so interested in it and asked how hard it was to erect and did it take long. Well this night, there was a crowd of us sitting around after dinner chatting and up they drove, screeched to a halt, both jumped out, flew around like maniacs and had everything up and shipshape in about a minute flat, much to the laughter and clapping of us all.

Margaret, whose time we felt must have been totally taken up with E matters and her family of five, had another important string to her bow. She was one of the top people in the Creche and Kindergarten Association and for many years responsible for passing all the Child Care Centres for accreditation to the Association. Well, I knew her, well before our E days. Our kids went to the Mitchelton Child Care Centre – not quite up to scratch in Margaret's eyes it would seem. We had *several* visits to check on things and what a commotion there would be when the word would spread "Mrs Sutherland is coming today". She would strike fear into the toughest heart. I told her about her 'reputation' later and how she enjoyed it.

She was Queensland's Mother of the Year in 1985 and was presented with an OAM in 1986 for her work with children. Both well deserved honours.

They were the days.
